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Varady

New standards have emerged in the simple system of coordinates within which assessments of impartiality are normally made especially in the field of international commercial arbitration. In a 2011 Malaysian case a successful challenge was submitted by an arbitrator (rather than by a party) against a co-arbitrator. In another case, the question arose whether the parties may set group-affiliation as a precondition (rather than as a disqualifying factor). In 2011, the Supreme Court of England faced the issue whether an arbitration clause can be valid if it states that only members of the Ismaili community can be chosen as arbitrators.

Professor Varady is an internationally recognized scholar and expert on international trade, commercial transactions and dispute settlement. He was director of the Center for International Studies of Novi Sad Law School in the former Yugoslavia. Since 1993, Varady has been a professor at the Central European University in Budapest and chair of the International Business Law Program. He is a member of the Hague Permanent Court of Arbitration. Varady also acted as agent and counsel in 11 cases before the International Court of Justice.
